Old and unwanted medicines in your home can pose a risk for accidental poisoning, theft, and drug abuse. Research also shows that medicine put down the drain or flushed may pollute water and harm fish and wildlife.

What should I do with my unwanted prescription, overthe-counter, and pet medications?

1. Take it to the Box. You can safely dispose of unwanted and expired materials at a year round drop box located in law enforcement facilities. See below for regional Take it to the Box locations.



Take it to THE BOX

2. Medicine Cabinet Clean-Out events at the Household Hazardous Waste facility at 27th Ave. W. & the Waterfront. Residents may drop off unwanted medications 8 am to 4:30 pm during these events. Medications are only accepted at this facility on special collection days.

3. Dispose of medicine in the trash. Drop off options are best

because they ensure proper disposal, but if you are unable to use them, follow these instructions:

- 1. Scratch out the patients name
- 2. Add liquid, sawdust, or spices to destroy the product
- 3. Seal the container with strong tape
- 4. Hide it in a non-transparent container or bag
- 5. Throw it away as close to trash pick-up as possible

Prepare for all drop off programs:

- Keep medications in the original container and place in a sealed, clear plastic bag.
- Use marker to cross out your name on the container. Drop off is anonymous — no ID is required.
- If you don't have the original container, place it in a clear plastic bag and write the name of the medication on the bag.
- · Needles, syringes, lancets, and thermometers are only accepted at the WLSSD Household Hazardous Waste facility at 27th Ave. W. & the Waterfront in Duluth.
- Businesses must call the Clean Shop at 218-726-1602 to schedule an appointment.
